Thanks to a generous donation of \$15K from the Andeavor Foundation, STTE was able to partner with UTEP Tech-E (Technology Exploration), NMSU Camp Innoventure and Texas Tech College of Architecture to offer free Summer STEAM Camps. T Camps were part the foundations initial phase of cultivating a tech startup revolution for our region. **Camps impacted 134 youth and focused on augmented reality, applied tech, architecture, and entrepreneurship.**

STTE partnered with Workforce Solutions Borderplex to host STEAMx, a unique multidimensional two-day event targeting over 1,200 high school and middle school students from the region. The purpose of the STEAMx is to increase awareness of opportunities in STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics) education and careers.

STTE Foundation collaborated with Techstars, a worldwide network that helps entrepreneurs succeed, to launch the firstever Techstars program for high school youth. On November 15th and 16, STTE facilitated two half-day workshops in two of El Paso's largest El Paso school districts -- El Paso Independent School District and Socorro Independent School District. This was the first-ever high school entrepreneurial Techstars pilot project and impacted 1,082 students representing 18 high schools. Microsoft sponsored partner with a \$15K contribution.
